
The Beginning of the End (of the Kingdom of Israel)

The main idea of Isaiah 49:1-13

God has appointed His Suffering Servant to bring salvation to all nations.

The following questions can be used during a family worship time. Take time as a family this week to talk about the Story and what you are learning as you read. The hymns on the next pages are from our worship service. Sing them together as a family during your family worship time this week.



Discussion questions:

If you ruled a country, what kind of ruler would you be? What rules would you make for your people?

Why did Hezekiah experience so many difficulties? Does obedience to God guarantee prosperity?

What are some main themes in Isaiah's prophecies?

Hezekiah pleased God when he spiritually cleaned house, got rid of idols, and smashed and cut down all the signs of spiritual compromise in the land. When you look at your spiritual life, what could you clean out, cut down, or smash so that you can walk more closely with God?
